
YEAR 8 DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY

The Year 8 project for Design and Tech is to design a toy timber truck and this year has produced some of the best projects we have ever seen.

Students have to first plan out their trucks by researching existing designs and evaluating these designs. They then use this research as inspiration to develop their own ideas using 2 dimensional orthogonal drawings (many views of the same object). Once these drawings have been made they can then create a material list of what they will require. They then produce the project in the workshops using mixed materials and then evaluate their final products. This project is great for introducing the students to the basic concepts of millimeter accuracy, square (90 degrees), hand skills in using tools and machines, idea generation and project management.







STAGE 5 FOOD TECH

In Stage 5 Food Technology, students have been focusing on food plating and presentation. They have used a variety of garnishes including edible flowers, herbs and sauces to enhance the visual appeal of their food products. Students put a lot of effort into plating and presenting their Acai Bowls and deconstructed custard horns, Recipes below.





SUSHI, COCKROACHES AND EXPLODING KITTENS IN THE LIBRARY

School libraries have undergone a revolution from silent spaces that store books to social hubs for growth and interaction.

During break times, Wollumbin's library is a thriving air-conditioned social hub where students come to interact and play games. The games cupboard is stocked with all the old favourites like Monopoly, Scrabble, Uno, Chess and Scrutiny along with newer styled board games that are driving the board game revival.

With advice from the crew at Cracklepoint Games in Murwillumbah, we invested in games such as Cockroach Poker, Ticket to Ride, Pandemic Hot Zone, Exploding Kittens, Dixit and Sushi Go Party. Students also bring their own games and gaming devices. These can all be played within one or two breaks and require a range of strategic approaches. They build collaborative and creative thinking skills and encourage healthy competition. They require concentration, social skills, perseverance and risk-taking in a safe environment.


We have also retained the sound-proofed study rooms for students who prefer quiet conversation or want to read and study.
