The world has its fair share of strange theme parks; however, have you been to a cheese theme park? What about a toilet museum? These theme parks and so many other locations can be found in South Korea.

Located in Seongsu-myeon, South Korea on 32 acres dedicated to cheese, Imsil 'Cheese park' is the ideal location for all cheese lovers. With cheese making courses, a viewing platform that looks like cheese, playgrounds for children and buildings that give you a Sound of Music vibe, this Cheese theme park is an excellent place to visit for all ages. Some other notable things to see there are a building named 'the cheese castle', figurines that have nothing to do with cheese scattered around the park (including a knock off Princess Daisy), a cheese slide, cheese shop and numerous objects with iconic cheese holes placed in them.



Now let's get a bit stranger, located in South Korea is the Haewoojae Museum, also known as the Mister Toilet Museum. The park has many fun toilet related facts and activities with many toilet related sculptures.





Lastly, there is also a Maze Land which are mazes that are constructed out of hedges & walls with varying difficulties.

Investing in our schools

The NSW Government is investing \$7 billion over the next four years, continuing its program to deliver more than 200 new and upgraded schools to support communities across NSW. This is the largest investment in public education infrastructure in the history of NSW.

The NSW Department of Education is committed to delivering new and upgraded schools for communities across NSW. The delivery of these important projects is essential to the future learning needs of our students and supports growth in the local economy.

Project overview

We are planning the development of an education campus at the Murwillumbah High School site. The campus will include a primary school, a high school and school community health facilities co-located within an integrated, purpose designed and built education campus.

Progress summary

We have now finalised the master plan for the campus. The master plan is the first of four design phases and provides a high level vision for the site. The final design of buildings will be determined in future design phases, in consultation with stakeholders.

We are also preparing to submit a request for the NSW Planning Secretary's Environmental Assessment Requirements (SEARs) for the project. This is the first step in the statutory planning approval process.

Online survey results

Feedback received through the stakeholder and community survey, which ran from 15 December 2020 to 15 February 2021, is being used to inform the design process.

Thank you to those who took part. The survey attracted more than 229 responses. See overleaf for a summary of what you told us.

Wollumbin High School has decided to embark on an outstanding learning initiative for our students, named the **Academic Achievement Centre (AAC)**. This service is voluntarily staffed by teachers across a range of subject areas. Students have the opportunity to work in small groups or independently, and can seek assistance from teachers with homework, assignments, exam preparation and general study techniques. These sessions will foster a collaborative approach to study and learning, and will result in many improved exam performances and self-confidence for participating students.
